# Literacy Council Adopts Mission, Vision, Values and Strategic Plan

On June 18, 2012 our Officers and Board of Directors adopted new guiding documents for our organization. Through a generous grant from the Ausherman Family Foundation, we were able to hire a consultant, Dr. Greg Powell, to lead us through the process of developing these new documents. Many thanks to the board members, students, and tutors who talked with Dr. Powell about our successes and opportunities for improvement at the Literacy Council. Through hours of discussions we updated our mission to read:

Mission—To assist adults in Frederick County in attaining the reading, writing and English-speaking skills needed to achieve personal goals and integrate more fully into the community.

**Vision—** By promoting literacy, the Literacy Council of Frederick County empowers people to live more fulfilling lives. By training volunteer tutors, we provide free, individualized instruction to adults in need of essential reading, writing, and English language skills.

Core Values—We believe in:

Providing learner-centered instruction with compassion, confidentiality, and respect.

Recognizing the power of our passionate and dedicated volunteers.

Educating a parent in order to educate a family.

Creating a safer, healthier, and more vibrant community through the ripple effect of adult literacy. Engaging with our community.

We love celebrating the success of our students and we are proud of all of them, Basic and ESL.. Our Basic program students find it especially hard to step forward to acknowledge an award or achievement because they felt so much shame in not being able to read. It takes a great amount of courage for many to sign on for help with our program. We are always willing to announce the achievements of **all** of our students if we hear about it from their tutors

We are proud to announce that one of our students, Rosa Arias, recently passed her citizenship exam. Sheli Radoshitzky is tutoring Rosa. We wish her much success in the future.

We are also proud to announce that Ling Yu has successfully completed 4 Early Childhood courses at FCC. She earned the 90-hour state Day Care Certification.

#### A Student Story By Her Tutor: Sheli Radoshitzky

Rosa is from El Salvador. I started tutoring Rosa on April 2011. When I first met Rosa her reading and comprehension capabilities were already advanced. However, her speaking, writing, and especially grammar capabilities were lagging behind. Therefore, during the first 6 months of tutoring we focused heavily on Grammar, Vocabulary building, Writing, and Computer skills. I also included listening, reading, speaking and pronunciation elements in each lesson.

In the last six months we have been working on her Naturalization test. My aim was to teach her the tools to be able to apply for the test and find study materials independently. She downloaded the application form and filled it out herself, with me as a bystander for any essential questions. She obtained a book to study for the civic test and we worked through it progressively, making sure Rosa understood the material, built up the necessary vocabulary, and felt comfortable with the exam format. Next I made flash cards for the 100 questions of the civic test, as well as flash cards for the reading and writing vocabulary. Each week I tested her over the questions, and prepared sentences for reading and writing to practice the English part of the exam. I also prepared overviews of all the civic information pertaining to US history, federal and state organization, and US geography using clear and simple flowcharts and similar tools. This helped Rosa significantly in seeing the whole picture and to pass the test. Rosa is a wonderful, sociable, and hardworking person. It has been extremely rewarding to work with her.

#### **Interview with ESL Tutor and Student**

Interview with tutor, Susan Birch, and student, Jin Wan.

## Susan, How did you first get involved with us?

I volunteered with the Literacy Council of Northern Virginia, and when I moved to Frederick in 2008, I decided to sign up with the local Literacy Council. Having been a former English teacher and editor, volunteering with the Literacy Council has been a perfect fit for me.

## How often do you and Jin meet? What kinds of things do you work on?

Jin and I meet once a week for 2 hours. We are working with the Laubach Way to English series, including its skill book and workbook; Patterns in Spelling; and idioms of the day from the EnglishClub.com website. To help improve her written communication skills, we go over e-mail messages that Jin sends to me, correcting spelling, grammar, and syntax. Jin also compiles lists of "problem words" that we go over in order to improve her pronunciation of words and build her vocabulary. We discuss various topics from the local newspapers and newscasts. We also occasionally read items from News for You.

## Do you and Jin have any specific goals that you are working towards?

In 2010, I worked with Jin on studying for the U.S. citizenship test, which she passed. She became a U.S. citizen. Recently, we worked on her application for voter registration; she now has her voter registration card and plans to vote in the fall election. Our current goal is to study for the TOEFL test since she wants to work toward receiving a bachelor's degree here in the U.S. On a continuing basis, we work on the following goals: improving fluency in English, improving written communications, improving pronunciation of words, increasing vocabulary, and improving reading skills.

# Susan, what would you say to other people in the community who wish they had a better command of the language but feel uncomfortable asking for help?

They really should not hesitate to ask for help. Volunteers with the Literacy Council want to help! The tutors enjoy language and working with students of various backgrounds.

#### Do you have any advice for people just now being trained to become a tutor - or to those maybe considering it?

I would encourage people to become tutors.

It is a very rewarding experience. Regarding advice for people now being trained to become a tutor, I would recommend that they start with what the student wants to learn and focus on that. The students may have specific goals that they want to achieve. The tutors can then add formal texts and structure to the lessons. Developing a close friendship with Jin and learning about her culture have been very rewarding for me.

## Jin, how did you find out about the Literacy Council?

I found out about the Frederick Literacy Council through my friend and contacted them about the English class. I was so lucky to get my tutor, Susan, within one month.

# Tell us about your background – where you grew up and what kind of education/schooling you had.

I grew up in Sichuan, China, and graduated from the Sichuan Conservatory of Music with a major in vocal.

# Have you noticed any improvements in your day-to-day life since working with Susan? What kinds of things do you work on together?

I have learned a lot of English since I began working with her in February 2009. I have gained more confidence in myself. I definitely feel that my English has improved so much.

We have become so close to each other after having studied together for more than 3 years. She is so generous and very committed to our work. She has encouraged me to do things I like, has helped me set my life goals, and has supported me in many areas of my life. We have studied lots of topics like politics, American history, Western cultures, etc. In our sessions, we have practiced speaking, listening, reading, and writing. She is very patient and corrects my English in a very kind and professional way.

Our next mission is for her to help me achieve high scores on my TOEFL test. I also want to work toward getting a bachelor's degree in the U.S. We'd also like to travel together to China some day.

# What would you say to other people in the community who wish they had a better command of the language but feel uncomfortable asking for help?

If you want to study English, don't hesitate to ask for help. The Literacy Council is a good place to begin because you get your own tutor who works with you at your own pace.

## Grant Success: Dollar General Literacy Foundation & The Wish You Well Foundation

Our grant committee has been diligently writing grants to find additional funds to grow our organization. Recently, we were awarded two grants from national organizations that support literacy initiatives. These two grants will provide \$10,000 to support our programs.

Caroline Gaver, President, stated, "Our goal, with the help of the grants from Dollar General and Wish You Well Foundation, is to increase our outreach effort in the community in order to gain additional volunteers to help more people needing to improve their literacy or language skills."

The Dollar General Literacy Foundation awards grants to organizations in communities served by Dollar General. The literacy grants support nonprofit organizations that provide literacy services such as adult basic education, GED preparation, English language acquisition or programs for youth who struggle with reading. - 1. 50 new tutors that have been trained and assigned students.
- 2. 50 new students that have been tested, evaluated, assigned a tutor and will have begun working toward their specific goals.
- 3. Wait times between first contact and testing and evaluation reduced from one month to one week or less.


