The gift of a tutor. This is about Caroline's story. Caroline Gaver has spent 40 years making the gift of tutors possible for thousands of adults in Frederick County, service which continues today (note 927 hours in 2014!). Caroline first became a tutor in 1975 because she knew people who could not read. She soon became a trainer of new tutors and was instrumental in forming literacy councils in Washington and Garrett Counties and in training tutors in Carroll and Allegheny Counties in Maryland and in Loudon County, Virginia.

Silvia's journey, like so many other adults struggling to gain proficiency in English really shows what Caroline's service means in the ability to transform lives. Described as "the heart of the Literacy Council," and "a tireless advocate," Caroline shared that she has remained with the organization for so long because of the great work done by volunteers in helping adults improve their lives through learning to read or to speak English, and the wonderful, dedicated people who choose to volunteer for this work.

Caroline's dedication also extends throughout other areas of the organization. She has served in every volunteer position available, including terms as board president or vice-president that have exceeded 20 years. In 2012 she was awarded the Wertheimer Fellow for Excellence in Volunteerism Award.

As the Literacy Council enters its 52nd year of providing services to our community, it is about the journeys along the way that our students and tutors are making together that transform lives. That is certainly something worth celebrating. Thank you, Caroline and Silvia, and also our many dedicated tutors and students for making the Literacy Council part of your journey.



State of Maryland and in another, the student got a library card and is now reading novels. Students applied for health insurance, opened bank accounts, read to their children, helped with homework, voted for the first time and obtained citizenship.

What was clearly on display as awards were presented was the bond that has developed between students and their tutors. The tutors repeatedly referred to the determination, dedication and hard work of their students, and there were frequent embraces as the awards were presented. Some students and tutors have been together for years and close friendships have developed. If the program lasted a bit longer than scheduled, it was largely because the tutors wanted to make sure the audience clearly understood just how special their students are.

The progress that can be achieved was apparent in the remarks of Silvia Muñoz Moreyra originally from Peru, who first came to the Literacy Council as a student and is now a tutor teaching English. She talked about the fear and uncertainty she felt learning a new language. She attributed her success to the "dedication, compassion and love" of Freida Pryor, her tutor and long-time ESL (English as a Second Language) Coordinator who has contributed an estimated 5,750 hours of her time.

Local business owners were presented with the Literacy Council's new Business & Industry Partner in Literacy awards recognizing their support for workplace literacy initiatives. Chef Mario Sanchez represented Phil Bowers, of Fountain Rock Management Corporation, in accepting the award.



New Conversation Class Led By Students



A new Literacy Council conversation class is much more than just an opportunity for students to improve their English.

Held the first and third Tuesday every month from 11 a.m. until 2 p.m., the class is also a chance for participants to assert their leadership potential and make new friends. The topics discussed at each class are chosen by a five-member student coordinating committee. Maria Kummerfeldt is the class advisor who helps with pronunciation, sentence structure and the meaning of words when assistance is requested.

"The class is very much an informal neighborhood coffee klatsch," said Kummerfeldt, a Literacy Council tutor with more than 100 hours of experience with students. "People are coming together to be with each other as friends. They are open, welcoming and encouraging. The class has been developed by the student coordinating committee with an

outline of activities to keep the meetings interesting as well as a venue to improve conversation in English."

Seham Shokry from Egypt, a member of the student coordinating committee, sees the twice-monthly meetings as "a chance to speak [and interact with friends] and not just listen." She stressed that a wide array of topics for conversation in English has been chosen by the students, ranging from favorite foods and colors to discussions about the students' home countries and life in the United States. Questions and comments from all of the students are encouraged.

Kummerfeldt said conversations about the home countries and life in U.S. will be recurring topics with a focus on the American way of life, traditions, holidays and history.

For Shokry, the new conversation class is an opportunity to make new friends, as well as improve her English. "Most students don't have jobs yet and they spend a lot of time alone," she said. "We left friends and family behind [to come to the United States]. We need to have new friends. I need people around me."

Her sentiments are clearly shared by many Literacy Council students. Twelve to 15 attended the first two classes and participation is expected to grow. By unanimous agreement, each class has doubled from 1.5 hours to 3 to allow more topics to be discussed in English.

Kummerfeldt said the class has become "a brown bag get-together." Students have also brought in and shared food from their countries. The first two sessions featured dishes from Egypt, Thailand and Mexico.

Every student is encouraged to participate in class discussions and activities no matter how difficult participation may be for some. "We don't worry about mistakes," said Shokry. "We support [every student] and listen [to what they have to say]."

Thanks to the tutors who responded to our recent survey to gauge interest for Tutor In-Service Sessions. Now Someone Who Is Interested In Learning More About Becoming A Literacy Council Volunteer Tutor?

We are taking the show on the road! Update on the Literacy Council's New Online Library System!

If you have come into the Literacy Council Office recently, you might have noticed the bookshelves with the orange dots on them and wondered why the dots were there. Those tiny dots represent the progress being made on converting the Council's library from the index card system to a digital one. Every day, new books are added to the system and eventually, tutors and students alike will be able to check out books in the office, view new offerings over the web, search for materials online and even place a "hold" on some of the more popular offerings.

Currently, tutors and students can view some of the offerings available by going online to the [Literacy Council's Library](#). This will bring up a catalog screen that anyone can view without a password or identification code. From this screen, you can explore and see some of the books LCFC now has. To do this, simply type in a key word (like mathematics, for example) and click on the button that says "keyword" - your options and materials will pop up on the screen and you can click on each one and view them individually. If they are in the LCFC library, it will tell you how many copies are available or what the wait time is for that copy. You can do the same thing with the other buttons: "Title", "Author", and "Subject". The "Series" button will have entries in the near future. Some suggested topics to enter in the "keyword" category include: **Dictionary, Laubach Series, Mathematics, Phonics, Reference and Grammar.**

To help us in our quest to keep track all of the materials, if you have outstanding books that have been in your possession for some time, please consider bringing them in for bar coding and entry into the system. In the coming months, every tutor and student will be provided with an identification code and password along with directions for using the system.
