## Interview with ESL Coordinator, Freida Pryor

### *How did you first get involved with the Literacy Council?*

A friend of mine, Alice Brouillet, who at the time was President of the Literacy Council asked me if I would be interested in taking on the job of Treasurer since the present one was retiring. I was very familiar with the software that we were planning on using when we computerized our accounting. I said I would and so it began!

### *What do you like about being ESL Coordinator?*

I like the personal contact with each tutor and student and helping them set up their goals and strategy for attaining them. I am a retired Secondary School teacher and I was beginning to miss teaching. So, along with being a one on one tutor, I am helping many on

their journey. It is so rewarding to see a student get their GED, become a citizen, get a job, or just be able to help their child with their homework or read a bedtime story to their grandchild.

### *Describe the kinds of people coming in for help.*

The people who come into the council for help are from 43 different countries, are at all levels of English competency, and have as many goals as there are students. One thing in common is their desire to learn! They are very eager and most appreciative of the help we offer them.

### *How did you first get involved with Mid Atlantic Hispanic Chamber of Commerce?*

One of our long time tutors, Kate Buffer, received a special recognition award from the MAHCC for her

contribution to the Spanish community in tutoring so many non- English speaking people. She contacted me and asked me to call Dr Jorge Ribas about a possible partnership with them. I met with Dr. Ribas and found we could be an asset to one another. Teaching ESL members of our community to speak, read, and write English can only increase the economic stability and cohesiveness of Frederick County.



find out what happened to a fellow researcher who died there.


### *A Vintage Affair* by Isabel Wolff –


