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Tutor News and Updates:

One of our tutors, Isabelle Micaela Garcia, recently got a job with AmeriCorps for the Buffalo Urban League.

ESL Coordinator Freida Pryor is so proud of Isabelle and thought her recent success story could inspire other young people to volunteer. Isabelle's example shows how volunteering can help make a person more marketable for a career.

When did you tutor with the Literacy Council of Frederick County - and how did you find out about us? Was this your first time tutoring?

During the spring or summer of 2012, I had just finished my Bachelor's Degree from UMBC and wanted to volunteer (specifically as an English tutor) during my spare time. I found out about the Council using a simple Google search and immediately signed up for the training sessions. I finished the Literacy Council's tutor training program during September of that same year and met with my first student, Maria, a month later. I can remember being very excited and very nervous, as it was the first time I tutored. Ever.



Can you talk about a specific student and his/her successes - and elaborate a bit about your experience as a tutor?

your experience as a tutor? I only started tutoring when I joined the Literacy Council last year and have had only two students in that time. My first student was Maria. Her main goals were to speak English well enough to be able to find and keep a job and to be able to understand her children's teachers. I'll always remember when she told me, four weeks after we started tutoring, that she got a job at Buffalo Wild Wings. We prepared by learning the pertinent vocabulary words and phrases. Unfortunately, it also meant that we had to stop tutoring after she started her new job.

When did you get your new job with the AmeriCorps VISTA program - and where is it located?

I got my AmeriCorps job for the Buffalo Urban League this past May and it's located in Buffalo, New York. I'm very excited to start this position at the end of July and I'm already starting to mentally prepare for the Buffalo winter!

Do you think that tutoring gave you any special experience that prepared you for this job?

Yes! I love feeling like I'm helping someone out and I love feeling like I am doing something useful. In this way, tutoring really confirmed my desire to work in a non-profit setting. Apart from the administrative things like time management and filling out monthly tutoring reports, this experience gave me a little bit more insight into what it's like to volunteer and work for a nonprofit. And, most importantly, I saw a bit of what life is like from my student's point of view wherever this view might be from.

Do you plan to tutor in Buffalo?

I do! Buffalo has its own ProLiteracy affiliate so I hope that it will be very similar to our own Literacy Council here in Frederick. First, I want to acclimate to the city and my new schedule but, eventually, I do hope to tutor in Buffalo as well.

We love celebrating the success of our students and we are proud of all of them, Basic and ESL. Our Basic program students find it especially hard to step forward to acknowledge an award or achievement because they felt so much shame in not being able to read. It takes a great amount of courage for many to sign on for help with our program. We are always willing to announce the achievements of **all** of our students if we hear about it from their tutors.

Good News About Grants in 2013

We have received 3 very generous grants this year. They will help us to grow our organization.

The first one was from the **Ausherman Family Foundation** for a Capacity Building grant. We will use the money to hire Scott Grove, a marketing consultant, to assist us in crafting a Marketing Plan to attract students, tutors, funders and other volunteers. We received a similar grant from them in 2011 to write a strategic plan.

The second grant came from the **Randall Charitable Trust** of Frederick. We will use those funds to implement the plan that Scott writes. It may be used for printing and advertising. This is our first grant from them.

The third grant is from **Dollar General Foundation** and this money will be used for salary, teaching materials and other supplies. We received a grant from them in 2012. One of the founders of Dollar General was illiterate, so they fund literacy organizations with their Foundation.

The goals for all three grants are the same: Increase the number of students by 50. Increase the number of tutors by 50.

We appreciate the grantors' confidence in us as an organization. We also appreciate our grants committee that does all the writing: Caroline Gaver, Diana Halleman, Stanley Schweinfurth, Carla Clark, Isabelle Garcia, Sandy Doggett and new members, Molly Doggett and Ryan Bell. These grants total \$28,500 for 2013.
