Executive Director's Corner - Laurie Fisher



"The single greatest indicator of a child's future success is the literacy level of the parents." ProLiteracy

This simple, yet powerful, statement from our national affiliate organization *ProLiteracy* is one that we have been recently citing in our public communication. In order to better understand the impact of our own local literacy programs, we have begun tracking how many of

the adults we serve have children. While we are still gathering data, preliminary results indicate that our current clients are parents of over 185 children ages 0-21!

ProLiteracy's Spring 2016 issue of <u>Voices</u> talks about the 30 Million Word Gap from a landmark research study <u>Meaningful Differences in the Everyday Experience of Young American Children</u> by Betty Hart and Todd Risley that uncovered a "word gap" between children from low-income homes and their more economically advantaged peers.

The study showed that indicators of accomplishment for children at age 3 were highly indicative of performance when older on vocabulary, language development and reading comprehension. Therefore the foundation built at 3 was critical for achieving future progress. The authors noted: "By giving children interactions and experiences with adults who take the time to teach vocabulary, oral language concepts, and emergent literacy concepts, children should have a better chance to succeed at school and in the workplace."

The significance of these findings highlights the importance in reaching vulnerable members of our community during this critical time in their lives, and the lives of their children. Literacy programs are an investment in the future of our community.

We owe a sincere thank you to the many individuals and organizations that make our work possible!


FALL

Every year, one in six young adults-more than 1.2 million-drop out of high school.

An excess of \$230 billion a year in health care costs is linked to low adult literacy.

\$225 Billion

Individuals at the lowest literacy and numeracy levels have a higher rate of unemployment and earn lower wages than the national average.

75% Seventy-five percent of state prison inmates did not complete high school or can be classified as low literate.

Two Thirds

Adult education is in critical need for services. A decline in federal and state funding in the past 10 years has resulted in programs serving only a fraction of the adults in need.

Currently, two-thirds of adult education programs are struggling with long student waiting lists.
