International Literacy Day - Literacy is an economic and community issue

On September 8th we celebrated International Literacy Day. This is a good time for all of us in Frederick County, including business and government leaders, to recognize that literacy is an important issue in our community.

We're used to thinking of illiteracy as a problem in other cities or other countries. But illiteracy is a major problem right here at home. In Frederick County, about 10 percent of our population over 18 lacks a high school diploma, about 17,000

adults are functionally illiterate, and about 8,000 immigrants are unable to speak English well.

ProLiteracy, a national literacy advocacy organization, points out that adultliteracy can change everything. Every important social issue - health, gender equality, poverty, crime - is affected by low literacy. When individuals learn how to read, write, do basic math, and use computers, they have the power to lift themselves out of poverty, lower health care costs, find and keep sustainable employment, and change their lives and those of their children.

In the United States:

Children of parents with low literacy skills have a 72 percent chance of being at the lowest reading levels themselves. These children are more likely to get poor grades, display behavioral problems, have high absentee rates, repeat school years, or drop out.

Of adults with the lowest literacy levels, 43 percent live in poverty. 70 percent of adult welfare recipients have low literacy levels. Low literacy costs the U.S. at least \$225 billion each year in non-productivity in the workforce, crime, and loss of tax revenue due to unemployment.

An excess of \$230 billion a year in health care costs is linked to low adult literacy. Nearly half of American adults have difficulty understanding and using health information. They can't read their doctors' instructions or the directions on their prescriptions. Lack of understanding also impedes adults' abilities to make appropriate health decisions and increases the likelihood that they'll incur higher health costs.

About 50 percent of the 2 million immigrants that come to the U.S. each year lack high school educations and proficient English language skills. This severely limits their access to jobs, further education, and citizenship, and increases their vulnerability to living in poverty.

75 percent of state prison inmates did not complete high school or can be classified as low literate. Research shows that inmates who are educated are 43 percent less likely to return to prison.

When adults are able to access literacy programs, they get better jobs, buy health insurance, attain citizenship, get a driver's license, become able to buy a car or home, and can communicate with their children's teachers to assist in



Student-Led Conversation Class:

New members are invited to join us on the first and third Tuesdays of the month from 11:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. for informal chats, student presentations as well as short grammar and idiom lessons. Students are invited to give presentations on their first year in the United States, their culture, customs, and history, or book reports on books they may be reading in English. Although at times students will share a taste of their cuisine with us, we ask that you bring your lunch.

Beginning Writing 1 Class: Beginning September 6, 2016, 9:30-11:00 a.m. on Tuesdays. The class focuses on writing strong paragraphs and correct grammar usage.

Beginning Writing 3 Class: Will be held September 7th through November 23rd on Wednesdays from 11:30 a.m.-1:00 p.m. The class will concentrate on developing strong sentences and clear and precise paragraphs. "Reading With My Mom" Reflections from a New Tutor, by Britta Kallevang

When I was in high school, my mother volunteered at a literacy organization based in our hometown of Independence, Missouri. She worked full time, was active at church and my high school band booster club. It's not like she needed a hobby or anything. What motivated her to prepare lessons and meet with her student each week was a deep love for books and learning. "Books are our best friends," she said on many occasions. I rolled my eyes, of course, though I knew what she meant. Books are the gateway to whole worlds and stories about people, real and imagined. When I was little, we read Charlotte's Web, Velveteen Rabbit, Jeremy Fisher, The Neverending Story and many, many others before bed. I fell in love with books through my mother's love for them.

This spring, some twenty years after my mom's stint as a literacy volunteer, I moved to Frederick from Seattle. I'd experienced some set-backs and my family in Frederick welcomed me to come live with them until I could get back on my feet again. It's hard to start all over again.

Having arrived at this juncture in life, I found myself scrambling to remember basic life skills. I thought maybe I could volunteer as a way to get to know the community, and give myself purpose while I got settled and looked for work. It didn't take a lot of reflection to realize that I wanted to begin tutoring. The ability to read and write are tools we often take for granted. Language fluency is power, a skill-set I believe we all deserve.

When people ask how I found the Literacy Council, I have to laugh. I just Googled it! I knew what I wanted to do, and just needed to find out if those services were available here in Frederick. Caroline Gaver responded to my inquiry and encouraged me to attend the next tutor training, which was less than a week out. I'm so glad I went, not just because completing the training afforded me the chance to start tutoring, but because I got to know the other tutor trainees. It was energizing to be around others who shared my passion for literacy. Only a couple of weeks later, I met my first student. enables people who are eager to learn to read or to speak English have the help they need to become an integral part of our community.

Adult education is in critical need for services. A decline in federal and state funding in the past 10 years has resulted in programs serving only a fraction of the adults in need.

Currently, two-thirds of adult education programs are struggling with long student waiting lists. More people, especially prospective tutors, need to know about us and the invaluable opportunities we offer. There's always a waiting list of students who need tutors. Spread the word!
