Literacy Council Receives United Way Community Impact Grant

The Literacy Council is honored to have L been selected as a Community Impact Partner by the United Way of Frederick County. Partners were chosen based on their fit with the United Way's funding priorities: health, education, and financial stability for families that struggle to afford basic costs of living. The Literacy Council, of course, is an educational organization, but United Way also recognized that the English language skills our adult students attain are a major factor in creating financial stability for their families. With the 3-year grant that this partnership

brings, the Literacy Council will be able to expand our workplace English program to help workers learn the English they need to succeed and advance in their jobs. The grant also enables the Literacy Council to implement a new project to directly reach parents with limited reading or English language proficiency who have young children served by Frederick County Public Schools' Judy Center and two Title I elementary schools. The goal of the initiative is to improve family literacy skills and parents' engagement with their children's education.



Remembering Elizabeth Derr & Joyce Routzahn Holiday Book Drive

The Literacy Council's volunteer and dear friend Elizabeth Derr died on July 14, 2018. Elizabeth was a tutor, but was best known for her quiet and efficient way of keeping the LCFC office organized and open. For almost three decades she ordered and organized all of our teaching materials and supplies. If you needed anything, she was the one to go to. In the years before we had any staff, Elizabeth trained many volunteer office staffers and signed up countless new tutors and students. In 2011, she was the recipient of our highest honor, given only occasionally: the Elizabeth H. Seligmann Award for sustained and significant contributions to the Literacy Council.

Long-time Literacy Council volunteer and all-around remarkable woman Joyce Routzahn died on June 13, 2018, at the age of 88. She had been volunteering with the Literacy Council for 42 years, taught more adult learners than she could count, and was still tutoring a student only a few months before her death. She also trained hundreds of new tutors and conducted training workshops for literacy councils in three states. Joyce had exceptional knowledge and skills, but perhaps most outstanding was her cheerful, positive outlook. Each student, group of new tutors, or situation presented a new challenge – an opportunity and a learning experience – and her enthusiasm was infectious.

The Literacy Council of Frederick County partnered with Curious Iguana and Barnes & Noble Booksellers for the benefit of Blessings in a Backpack (BIAB) to provide new books for pre K - 6th grade children. BIAB provides weekend backpacks of food to the more than 2,500 children in 17 Frederick County schools who depend on school meals as their primary source of nourishment during the week. Donated gift books in holiday wrapping were included in these backpacks before the winter break. While the Literacy Council serves adult literacy needs, providing appealing, ageappropriate books to children fosters literacy at a young age and helps to break the cycle of illiteracy in families.

Now in its 12th year, in the past our Holiday Book Drive provided books for other local agencies including Head Start, the YMCA's Early Learning Center, Toys for Tots, Advocates for Homeless Families, and Children of Incarcerated Parents (COIP).
