# Workplace and Parent Literacy Programs Expand

A s a new United Way of Frederick County Community Impact Partner, the Literacy Council's new Workplace and Parent Literacy Programs expanded operations during this past year by building new collaborations to reach employees in the hotel industry and parents of elementary school children. Both these programs benefit the whole community in a number of ways.

The goal of the Workplace Literacy Program is to help employees with limited English proficiency find and keep employment. This contributes to the financial stability of the employees and their families and also benefits employers, who find they have reduced rates of employee turnover and a more accomplished workforce. Kim Brown, the Literacy Council's Workplace Program Coordinator, worked with instructor Victoria Dos Santos to develop a curriculum to meet the goals of Econo Lodge Frederick. 12-week class sessions were conducted for housekeeping staff, focusing on English speaking and comprehension, workplace vocabulary, workplace skills, interaction among staff, and

basic conversation skills. General Manager Rupali Luthra scheduled the classes during her employees' work time and was enthusiastic about the results: "Our Guest Survey scores have improved tremendously. The women are confident in their interactions with the guests, which has boosted their morale and the quality of work. The teamwork within the department has improved and the housekeepers seem much happier. They feel a sense of belonging to the organization and their community at large."

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The Parent Literacy Program helps parents of young children served by the Frederick County Judy Center and three Frederick County Public Title I Elementary Schools. Based on referrals from the Judy Center or family liaison coordinators, Literacy Council volunteer tutors are matched with parents who need literacy and English language instruction. Led by Holly Bohman, the Literacy Council's Parent Literacy Program volunteer coordinator, volunteer teams attended Family Literacy events, helped parents fill out school forms, conducted parent workshops, and provided weekly tutoring or class instruction for parents. The program works to improve family literacy skills and children's readiness for school, as well as to

familiarize parents with positive approaches to early childhood development.

We've felt privileged to be part of this multi-system structure of

improving literacy through strategic collaboration with community and public school resources.


## Our first literary magazine *Reflections–Voices of English Learners*

**R**eflections is a compilation of stories and poems written by Literacy Council students using their newly learned English skills. It features their photographs and artwork, too.

Our students come from all corners of the world and all walks of life, and they have amazing stories to tell. By the time they walk through the doors of the Council for the first time, they have overcome many obstacles. Hearing in class the hope, wisdom, and integrity in her students' words, Catherine Coundjeris, volunteer writing class instructor, felt that they deserved to have their voices heard. She was especially touched when one of her students shyly revealed her aspiration to write and publish her own memoir. This

student's aspiration and the stories and hard work of her other students inspired Catherine to give them the concrete encouragement that publication of their own words would bring.

Catherine was joined in this effort by volunteer tutor and author Julie Heifetz, who was excited about the opportunity to help produce a literary magazine that would include works by both ESL and native English-speaking literacy students. Graphic designer Betsy Gaymon contributed the design of the magazine. Stella Henson wrote and directed a play for Backyard Kids' Theatre - which provides children in downtown Frederick a summer time opportunity to take part in the production of a play, from acting to costume design -



and donated profits from ticket sales to cover our publishing costs as well as a donation from the Frederick Writers Salon.

In September 2018, Curious Iguana bookstore hosted a book launch, giving student authors the opportunity to read from their work before an audience of their volunteer tutors and community members. Many, many thanks to Marlene and Tom England, and the whole staff at Curious Iguana!

## Giving Societies Inaugurated at Anniversary Reception

The Literacy Council celebrated Its 56th year with a reception and the introduction of its new program of Giving Societies on October 29, 2018 at the Delaplaine Visual Arts Education Center. During the event, the Council's friends and supporters were acknowledged and thanked for their contributions to the organization's adult literacy programs. Board of Directors Vice President Richard Haney announced the new initiative: In honor of three remarkable women, Dolly Engle and Kay Mackley, who founded the Literacy Council of Frederick County in 1963, and Caroline Gaver, our long-time President, now Board Member-Emeritus, the Board of Directors recently established The Campaign for Literacy Giving Societies.

These Giving Societies recognize the generosity of individuals, businesses, foundations, and other community organizations without whose support we could not have helped over 8,500 adults learn to read, write, or speak English. Attaining literacy has improved our students' quality of life and has also contributed to the overall economic vitality of our community – higher literacy rates mean a more highly qualified local workforce, a sturdier tax base, better public health, and many other benefits.

The Board also announced the new Leadership Giving Society, honoring donors for their lifetime giving, and the Legacy Giving Society, honoring those who have designated the Literacy Council in their estates.

Inaugural members were inducted into each of the Giving Societies in recognition of their financial gifts and their roles as goodwill ambassadors for the Council. Supporters who contributed to the Betty Seligman Literacy Endowment Fund through the Community Foundation of Frederick County were also thanked. Their examples encourage and inspire others to join our effort to end illiteracy in Frederick County. Each inductee received a copy of the Literacy Council's new literary magazine *Reflections* - Voices of English Learners in recognition of this honor. Prior to presenting Reflections, eight Literacy Council students read from their published work, sharing their personal stories and connection with the Council.

### LCFC Receives Gift From Long-Time Tutor Joyce Routzhan

Long-time Literacy Council volunteer and all-around remarkable woman Joyce Routzahn named the Literacy Council to receive a gift from her estate. Joyce died on June 13, 2018, at the age of 88. She began volunteering with the Literacy Council in 1976. She was an elementary school teacher who tutored many children as well as our Literacy Council adult students - she often worked with as many as six adults simultaneously. Over the years she tutored more students than she could count and was still tutoring until a few months before her death. She was respectful of each one, very patient, and devoted to helping them all. She worked with students at all levels, but had a special gift for working with the developmentally disabled.

Joyce also became a tutor trainer, helping to train hundreds of new tutors. She had exceptional knowledge and skills, but perhaps most outstanding was her cheerful, positive outlook. Each student, group of new tutors, or situation presented a new challenge – an opportunity and a learning experience for her – and her enthusiasm was infectious. Joyce led a good, productive, and interesting life, and those who had the privilege of knowing her were very fortunate.
