

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The Big Switch to Online Learning

Distance learning tools expand access to Literacy Council adult learners

Soon after the Literacy Council's staff and volunteers were forced to work remotely due to the COVID-19 public health emergency, it quickly became apparent that in order to provide much-needed support to adult learners served by our programs, it was time to embrace online learning tools. The Literacy Council team didn't skip a beat and jumped headfirst into switching to a digital platform.

To quickly and successfully transition to an online learning environment, Jennifer Szabo, Program Manager, organized surveys to gauge the needs of both students and tutors, including their access to technology, schedules, and availability. With feedback from the Literacy Council's 130+ volunteer tutors and 300+ adult learners, she created a schedule of online classes for those who wanted to continue tutoring and class sessions online.

In addition to offering online learning sessions, the team of English as a Second Language (ESL) and Basic Literacy Volunteer Coordinators transitioned from weekly shifts in the office coordinating tutors and students, to remote work with weekly online meetings.

Literacy Classes in the Workplace Benefiting lives both at work and at home

The Literacy Council of Frederick County (LCFC) is partnering with Plamondon Hospitality Partners (PHP) to bring English classes to hotel associates, which aim to benefit the lives of associates both at work and at home.

Associates who work at four Frederick campus hotels attended weekly classes from January to March of this year, before transitioning to the next set of classes online in June. For the transition to online classes, PHP provided laptops, tablets, and technical support for their employees to participate.

The Literacy Council curriculum was adjusted to specifically meet the needs of PHP employees with a focus on updated cleaning and maintenance processes required by the hotel industry. LCFC's Workplace Program Coordinator, Kim Brown, and instructor, Carolann McConaughy, worked closely with Leah Knecht, PHP Talent Manager, to create a curriculum emphasizing vocabulary and customer interactions associated with disinfecting and sanitizing hotel properties. Students practiced basic customer conversations related to frequency of

sanitization and items being disinfected to boost consumer confidence that appropriate guidelines were being followed at all PHP properties.

This partnership is the result of recent efforts to expand LCFC's Workplace Literacy Program in collaboration with employers in Frederick County from the hospitality and restaurant industries to support English classes at the workplace. The purpose of the program is to empower employees with limited English language proficiency to gain sustainable employment, to achieve greater financial stability, and to positively impact the lives of their families. The program will also help employers identify and retain an educated workforce and reduce turnover, thereby strengthening the entire community.

Leah Knecht shared her observations about the program's impact:

"The Literacy Council of Frederick County has provided our associates an opportunity to improve their English workplace literacy skills, and by doing so, it has given them the confidence they need to interact directly with our guests. Our associates enjoy their classes, and they cannot wait to continue their learning."

Parent Literacy Program: Helping lead families to success

The Literacy Council's Parent Literacy Program, led by volunteer coordinator Holly Bohman, strives to help parents of young children with limited English skills in the Frederick County community.

The program centers on four domains of English communication, including listening,

speaking, reading, and writing, with the goal of supporting parents as they lead their families to success. Families are thoughtfully matched with volunteer tutors for weekly instruction and guidance. Through language instruction and special activities, like Back to School Nights and Family Literacy events, parents not only gain the ability to better help their children in school but to improve their own lives as well.

Frederick County Public Schools (FCPS) Community Liaison staff, in partnership with the Frederick County Judy Center, work with the Literacy Council at Hillcrest, Lincoln, and Waverley elementary schools, where there is a greater need for these services. The Judy Center is an organization that provides a range of services to help improve school success through early intervention, like family mentoring, developmental screenings, family literacy, and many more.

Through this partnership, we've worked together to create a multi-system approach to improving literacy through strategic collaboration with community and public school resources. Our aim is to improve literacy skills and family engagement so parents may successfully enroll their children in school and navigate the child's school system. With positive early childhood development and school preparedness, parents can set an example for lifelong learning while their children enjoy better academic performance in school.

Improving the lives of families and children in our community through literacy leads to a safer, healthier, economically stronger, and more vibrant community for everyone who lives and works here.

During these meetings, they review feedback from tutors and address student learning and technology access needs. Professional Development sessions and Tutor Chats are conducted remotely, and include sharing tips and lessons for using platforms such as Zoom, Skype, WhatsApp, Google Hangout, and Facetime.

Despite the reason for transitioning to digital learning platforms, the Literacy Council plans to continue using online learning as a tool going forward. Summer and fall classes continued online, and weekly curbside pickup for materials is available for tutors and students. By adapting to the circumstances and implementing these digital resources, the Literacy Council is supporting tutors and helping students continue to build literacy skills and expand accessibility, despite the unprecedented challenges that stood in their way.
